Hot Percolator Punch

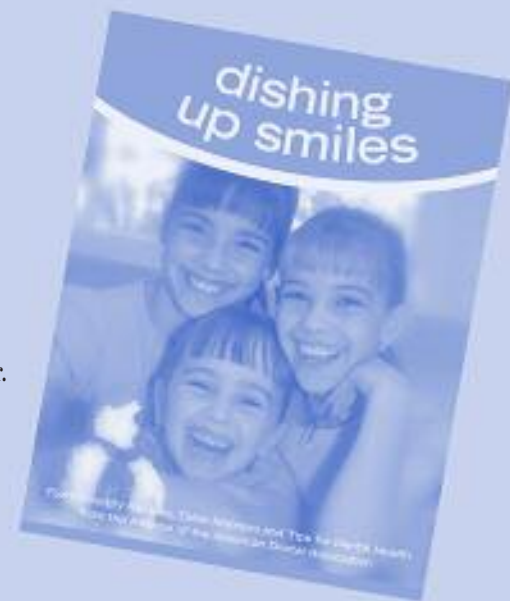
DebraAnn Grimes, Tennessee

- 3 cups pineapple juice
- 3 cups cranberry juice cocktail
- 1½ cups water
- 2 lemon slices
- 1½ teaspoons whole cloves
- ¾ cup firmly packed brown sugar
- 2 cinnamon sticks, broken

Mix juices and water in a 12-cup percolator. **Place** remaining ingredients in percolator basket. **Percolate** through entire cycle. **Serve** hot.

HEALTHY LIVES, HEALTHY LIFESTYLES:

Is your family on the right track?

How is your family? I hope you are all happy and healthy. Most of us consider our family the most important part of our life. As a teacher, I can tell you with utmost assurance that family IS the most important thing to a child.

As parents, we strive to provide the best of life's offerings, but sometimes we neglect to give our children what they need most: a safe and healthy haven in which to live. Some studies have suggested that children are more likely to lead healthy lives if they see parents and other family members making healthy choices first.

Today, our nation faces an obesity epidemic. According to current research, obese children ages six to nine years old have a 55 percent chance of becoming obese adults. Overweight adolescents have a 70 percent chance of becoming overweight or obese as adults. Many children already show the early warning signs of heart disease and Type II diabetes. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention estimate one in three children born in 2000 ultimately will develop diabetes because of eating too much and not exerting enough. According to the Surgeon General's Call to Action to Prevent and Decrease Overweight and Obesity (2001), "families and communities lie at the foundation of the solution to the problems of overweight and obesity."

Our goal should be to encourage lifestyles that include healthy eating and meaningful levels of physical activity. For children, these goals should include eating a variety of food, learning what and how to eat, and engaging in a minimum of one hour of physical activity a day. As parents, we should provide a healthy and nurturing environment for our family that promotes self worth, along with positive physical, mental, and social growth and development. Our role as professionals is to strive to provide families with information and education that improve their health and quality of family life.

For years, the dental profession has stressed good nutrition as a way to help build strong bones and teeth and prevent dental caries. How can the dental profession help our nation address this nationwide problem of overweight and obesity? First, **take care of your own family**. Be a good example: provide a family environment that promotes healthy eating and a fun active time together. Second, **promote healthy family**

lifestyles through dental health education time in your dental office.

Third, **encourage and support school and community based programs that influence your child's health.**

This includes volunteering personal time and providing financial support for programs that provide healthy opportunities for children.

I have been in the well-being industry for many years. My experience includes owning a wellness based fitness center, coordinating a hospital wellness and cardiac rehab program, and now teaching physical education and coaching children and teenagers. I have seen hundreds of diet and exercise gimmicks. Everyone wants results NOW, with as little effort as possible. Gimmicks don't work but small changes do. Walk or ride bikes with your family, eat more fruits and vegetables and less take-out. Take good care of your body so it can work properly. Do it for yourself and your family.

- ▶ Assist the Council on Access, Prevention and Interprofessional Relations (CAPIR) in all aspects of studying and promoting oral health literacy
- ▶ Serve as an informal conduit between the ADA and external organizations and institutions for oral health literacy activities
- ▶ Advise the council and the ADA regarding oral health literacy policies, programs and research

Lance's appointment is for a one-year, renewable term, contingent upon continuation of the NOHLAC. Unless renewed, the NOHLAC will terminate on December 31, 2009. She will attend the first NOHLAC meeting on April 15-16, 2008, at the ADA Headquarters Building.

Lance is a member of the Alliance of the Richmond Dental Society, and webmaster and advisor to the Alliance of the Virginia Dental Association. She served as president of AADA from 2002-2003. Lance is currently the Lead Clerk for the Senate of Virginia-Committee Operations, 2008 Session of the Senate Education and Health Committee.

Legislative Update

It was a great pleasure to represent the Alliance at the ADA's Council on Government Affairs meeting January 31-February 2 in Washington, DC. The meeting was packed with a great deal of information. Due to space constraints, I'll focus just on two areas:

MEGA DISCUSSION ON DENTAL ACCESS AND COVERAGE

The Council engaged in a mega discussion on proposed strategies for addressing dental coverage and access, and submitted suggestions to the ADA's Future of Health Care/Universal Coverage Task Force.

The Council suggested the task force identify means of engaging a wide variety of stakeholders both within and outside organized dentistry (including representatives of the insurance industry, medical and dental health care professionals, dental educators, dental students, and the underserved populations) in developing positions affecting dental coverage and access and in formulating diverse advocacy teams to work for such changes.

The Council also suggested that:

- ▶ In the absence of adequate dental coverage, dental services necessary to address infection prior to a covered medical procedure and to address deformities should be covered by a medical plan.
- ▶ At a minimum, dental plans should cover preventive services, oral health education, treatment necessary to treat pain and infection, and basic restorative services.
- ▶ Targeted adjustments to the dental delivery system (such as use of CDHCs and EFDAs) needed to address specific needs should be identified.
- ▶ A variety of tools and strategies should be developed to educate caregivers about the importance of oral health care.
- ▶ Strategies for fundamentally changing the Medicaid and SCHIP programs so more private sector dentists can participate need to be undertaken. Any such approach should support the dental team concept.
- ▶ Making all dental delivery systems more efficient is an important means of maximizing oral health care resources and should be addressed expressly.

APPROVAL OF ADA'S LEGISLATIVE PRIORITIES FOR 2008

Each year, the Council reviews and approves the Association's legislative priorities. For 2008, the high priorities include:

- ▶ Access to oral health care for Alaska Natives and American Indians
- ▶ Appropriations for dental research, education, the Indian Health Service, and military dental research
- ▶ Community Dental Health Coordinator (CDHC) advocacy
- ▶ Elder care legislative initiatives
- ▶ Health plan coverage
- ▶ Higher education legislation (to protect the accreditation process)
- ▶ Medicaid
- ▶ Meth Mouth
- ▶ Pay-for-performance or "quality measurements"
- ▶ Restorative materials
- ▶ SCHIP reauthorization
- ▶ Scope-of-practice issues

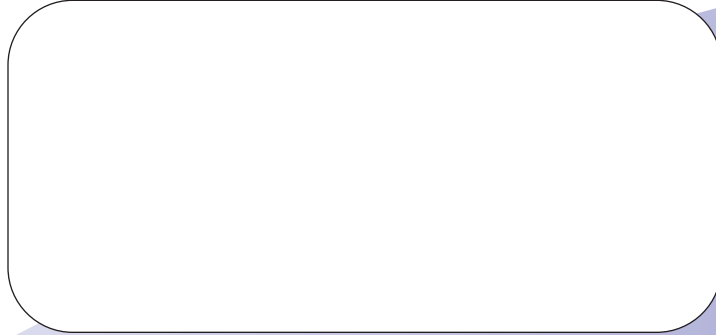
